




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NOTE FROM THE INTERIM PRESIDENT

perfect word to encapsulate all that is going on here.

So, what's new at Corban? Let's start with a new class of eager and enthusiastic students! Our students bring the energy that animates this beautiful hillside campus, and among them are Corban's first agriculture science majors. As the only Christian college west of the Rockies to offer such a program, we can help meet the enormous workforce need in this professional area. Best of all, our students will be able to do so with Christian character and conviction.

This year's University Cabinet includes three new members whose strong commitment to biblical values, student success, and creative problem-solving have enlivened our collaborative work. In addition to the Cabinet, we have many other new faces across the University, from Athletic Director to Campus Care. We thank the Lord for bringing those He chose to join in His work here!

We are also pleased to announce our hiring of a Nursing Program Director, Dr. Kathleen Kennedy. Her arrival allows us to seek state approval to initiate a nursing program. Student interest in nursing runs high, and it is an entirely missional endeavor. Please pray with us as we seek state approval to continue the program's development.

My new role as Interim President has been packed with opportunities to meet many friends of Corban. It's been gratifying and humbling to talk with committed alumni and gracious donors and learn how Corban continues to impact hearts and minds, as it has for 87 years.

I've met many whose faith in Christ and professional path were shaped here. I've heard from dear community members who have assured me they've been praying for us. I've talked to student leaders, mentored by godly, role-model faculty and staff. I've worked alongside colleagues who give 100% because they believe in our pivotal role in the mission. I've talked to parents who have encouraged me that Corban was completely worth the investment.

Our faculty and staff gathered in August as Dr. Mark Turman (Denison Forum) presented ideas from *The Coming Tsunami: Why Christians Are Labeled Intolerant, Irrelevant, Oppressive, and Dangerous*— and How We Can Turn the Tide. We considered cultural changes and pending legislative actions that could impact how we operate as a Christian university. Our discussion focused on Generation Z, the age group of most of our undergraduate students. While they have faced pandemic learning interruptions, rapid social change, and increasing technological dependency, we have the privilege of guiding them toward a life of Christian discipleship.

We want to show them the difference Christ has made in our own lives and do so with transparency and vulnerability. We can help students understand both the power and limitations of technology and suggest how they might temper its influence with reasonable boundaries. And we can teach them, as our speaker reminded us, "You will never know the eternal significance of daily faithfulness."

In today's post-truth culture, Corban offers a rare experience in the Pacific Northwest. We help Christian students pursue academic and professional programs with excellence while discovering their calling and giftedness. That's how we educate Christians who will make a difference in the world for Jesus Christ!

EQUIPPED TO EMBRACE THE UNEXPECTED: DAVID AND HEATHER HOLCOMB

"I don't think it's a coincidence that as soon as I grew in patience and accepted what God was showing me, this door opened," says David Holcomb. "I learned patience watching Heather."

David and Heather Holcomb are both Corban alumni. Married with two children, both have recently stepped into leadership roles they did not plan for or envision on their horizons. Since graduating in 2012 and 2011, respectively, David and Heather have moved from self-described, "living on next-to-nothing with a new baby," to unexpected ministries in new leadership positions. David transitioned from social studies teacher to the role of Instructional Mentor & AVID Coordinator at McNary High School, while Heather went from full-time mom to Development Director of Acres of Hope, a horse ranch that serves and offers mentorship to youth in need.

The opportunities were unanticipated, but their dedication to service and faithfulness to God's calling on their lives gave them the courage to step forward. "It has taken a lot of risk on our end, but it has been so fulfilling, because we were confident in what God was doing," Heather says.

In a few short years, Heather has seen Acres of Hope grow from a start-up nonprofit to a ministry that hosts 178 mentorship sessions a month. This past year, six of their programmers gave their lives to

Christ, including two who were baptized in a horse trough.

David's new role has given him an expanded platform for service. "It's opened up doors to being a part of all 2,000 kids' classrooms," he says. "I've had the opportunity to meet with struggling kids and their families and speak truth over them. That's what I needed in high school. It's what I needed at Corban, where I had incredible mentors. Seeing change happen at the family level is a door that God opened that I didn't understand was even a possibility."

For the Holcombs, their time at Corban was foundational to the work they are doing now. It was the bedrock experience that equipped them to step into God's calling with courage and competence. "Corban has amazing faculty and phenomenal staff," David says. "My professors, their service to Christ and their love for their students, how relational they were, made Corban's faith integration come alive. The examples they set, we take with us every day as we serve in our careers."









"I've learned so much about relationships, caring for people, and loving each other in community," says junior business major, Chris Nobles. "It's what makes Corban so beautiful."

Experience, the University's overnight event for prospective students. "What I actually remember the most was watching Corban students sitting in the coffee shop together after the main concert, late at night, inviting everyone into their group," he says.

"One girl had a ukulele, and they just started singing songs and worshipping together. That one little image sums up Corban so well."

Once he arrived on campus as a fulltime student, that singular image became a daily reality. "I didn't have a community like that in high school," he says. "It's so much easier to have the deep conversations about who I am in Christ here. I can share my struggles and insecurities and go so much deeper because of that shared faith."

Now, whether in class, in his dorm, or as a part of Corban's men's basketball team, Chris encounters authentic, life-changing community every day. It has begun to shape the way he sees his future. As a business major, Chris aspires to launch his own business one day, creating the kind of culture that

he found at Corban. "God intended us to live life in community," he says. "That doesn't stop at Corban. Someday, through entrepreneurship, I hope to be able to build a work community that brings people together, gives them a place to belong, and helps to impact the world around us."

As Chris looks toward his future, he is keenly aware of where it all began and the support it took to get him to this place. "I wouldn't have been able to come here if it wasn't for my scholarship support," he says. "It was more than just money to me. It was the possibility of that dream I first saw at Corban Experience, to grow as a person in community. I have friends, professors, mentors, and opportunities that have changed me because of Corban. A MESSAGE FROM BOARD CHAIR, ROD HOFF

As a Board, we are leaning into the truth that times of transition are often opportunities to trust God more fully. Changes in leadership always bring new opportunities. We have faith that God is already preparing His person to lead us as the next president of Corban University. His constant steadfastness to Corban is what gives us assurance. As we pray and listen for His will, as we are who we say we are and do what we say we will do, we are diligently preparing

for this transition. While our efforts are geared toward having a new president selected by July of 2023, we will continue to rely on God's timing, prioritizing the right candidate over a quick search. I am excited for the future, full of the kind of hope that can only come from faith in the One who remains constant through all the change in the world around us, the One we are wholly committed to—Jesus Christ.
