GROWING THROUGH SUPPORT: MATEO PEÑA

Corban sophomore, Mateo Peña, was born in Guatemala at the height of one of the most violent and destabilizing military coups in the country's history. "I do not think I would be alive today had my mother kept me in Guatemala," he says.

His road to America was that of a refugee. And yet, as his parents fled to the States, Mateo had to be left behind. It would be nine months before they could go back to Guatemala to rescue their baby boy.

Even before his first memories, this experience marked Mateo's life, and he considers it pivotal to his story and his future. "If I had stayed in Guatemala, there was absolutely no chance that I would be going to college, let alone surviving past the age of two years old," he says. "To be where I am at today, I know that it is one hundred percent God's work in my life."

At Corban, Mateo has found a community that is committed to hearing his story, building him up, and equipping him for future service. Whether walking around campus, living in the dorms, or engaging in one-on-one conversations with his professors, Mateo is thriving at Corban. "If I try to find a logical explanation for it, it just doesn't make sense. How do I go from living in a war-torn third world country to going to one of the best Christian colleges in

America?" he says. "At Corban, everyone knows my name, and it all feels genuine. I've never experienced that anywhere else."

As a ministry major and student in Corban's KAIROS program (a five-year, accelerated combined bachelor's and master's program), Mateo is already learning how to use his story to share the gospel. "Here, professors don't just give you the answer to 'why' you should be doing ministry, but they show us how," he says. "The ministry program is phenomenal. The professors genuinely care about you, which you don't see everywhere. My professors know me and my story on a personal level. We get to sit down and have coffee together and enter into fellowship as brothers and sisters in Christ."

After graduating, Mateo hopes to enlist in the military with the goal of becoming an army chaplain, serving those who have witnessed the same sort of violence and destabilization that he was born into. "There's a lot of hurt and brokenness in the armed forces," he says. "A lot of them have seen things that no one should ever have to see. I feel that Corban is equipping me to make a difference and shine a light to those who are hurting, to bring them hope and a reason to live."

Appreciated Securities: If you have experienced gains in the financial markets, consider donating

appreciated securities to the University to avoid paying capital gains taxes.

IRA Required Minimum Distributions: Don't miss this option! If you are age 70½ or older, consider making a qualified charitable distribution (QCD) from your IRA. With this option, you can transfer up to \$100,000 per year from your IRA directly to Corban University without having to pay income taxes on the money.

Annuities and Trusts: If you are interested in a guaranteed income stream and taking advantage of high interest rates, consider a charitable gift annuity or charitable remainder trust.

Donor-Advised Fund (DAF): If you would like to make a gift and receive an immediate tax benefit,

and then decide what programs to support, consider setting up a DAF.

On Thursday, October 20, Corban University hosted its first Agriculture Science Dinner, a time to celebrate and learn more about Corban's new agriculture science program, the first Christian program of its kind on the west coast.

The event was hosted at Quiet Meadows Farm, owned and operated by Board of Trustees member, Karen Avenelis, and her husband, Tom—both of whom serve on Corban's Agriculture Advisory Council. A long list of supportive companies such as Pratum Co-Op, John Holmlund Nursery LLC, Go Seed, Kuenzi & Company LLC, Lake Labish Farms LLC, Nutrien Ag Solutions, Smucker Mfg/ Visionworks Cameras, Valley Agronomics, Wilbur Ellis, and Wilco partnered with the University to sponsor the event.

Attendees enjoyed dinner while being able to meet and chat with students from Corban's inaugural ag science class. The highlight was the many student testimonies. Students like Lodi Halverson provided unique insight into how their experience at Corban has begun to transform their futures and shape them for service. "Before coming here, I was surrounded by a lot of people who didn't necessarily have the same beliefs as me, and that was something that took a toll on my spiritual health," he says. "But now, being at Corban, I am on the polar opposite side of that scale. In Romans chapter 12, Paul tells us, 'Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will.' It has been incredible for me to be able to have small conversations with new, like-minded people, to be able to give life advice to kids who need it, and to go to chapel three times a week. The entire experience at Corban has helped me grow quickly and is something I am thankful for."

SCIENCE SATURDAYS OFFER A WINNING MIXTURE


