WARRIOR WELCOME WEEKEND UNITES A FRESH CAMPUS COMMUNITY

Warrior Welcome is so much more than a typical college move-in day. It's more than the handmade signs and pom-poms that line Warrior Way, ushering new students onto campus. It's more than student leaders carrying boxes to fresh dorm rooms or leading families on tours. It's more than the boisterous cheers echoing from the Outdoor Athletic Complex or the laughter of the late-night pancake feed. 



\$100,000 GRANT FROM AGWEST FUNDS THE CREATION OF NEW SOIL SCIENCE LAB



Corban University is pleased to announce it has been awarded \$100,000 through AgWest Farm Credit's Local Advisory Committee (LAC) Guided Stewardship Funds to be used toward the creation of a new soil science lab for the University.

"This investment by AgWest is a great way to be validated in what we're doing, serving our ag community and serving our students as well," said Corban University Director of Agriculture Science, Dr. Susie Nelson. "We are training our students to be out there in the ag community, equipped with the knowledge to serve."

The soil science lab will be created to the dual purpose of training students in hands-on research, especially in the areas of soil health and sustainability, while also serving the local agricultural community by offering timely and effective soil testing. Dr. Nelson plans for students to be conducting real-world research and testing in a modular version of their lab this fall, with plans for expansion to a more commercial lab setting on the horizon.

Soil health has been a hot-button issue in the ag community as sustainability rises to the forefront of global conversations concerning agricultural practices and feeding a growing population.

The \$100,000 grant to Corban University's ag science

program also aims to serve the community by reducing the long turnaround time for testing results often experienced by local farms and farmers.

For Corban, the investment marks a significant step for its young ag science program, which officially launched in 2022, and a potential windfall for community partnership between the University and the local agricultural community.

"We want to build this with the input of our ag community, to serve them, but for this also to be a revenue generator for the University so that operating costs can be covered and this lab and service to the ag community can be sustainable," said Corban University Senior Development Officer, Scott Sherman. "This grant represents a new community partnership that we are excited to see grow into the future."

GLOBAL PARTNERSHIP WITH WHOLE WORD INSTITUTE IMPACTS MILLIONS

This summer, one of Corban University's key partners, Whole Word Institute, an organization based in Jerusalem with a unique approach to training Bible translators, celebrated another graduating class. This year's 24 graduates represent 15 different nations and 13 language translation projects, with the potential to give access to the Scriptures to more than 5 million people.

Whole Word Institute's primary goal is to provide biblical language training and resources to support the growing global demand for localized, church-led Bible translation. Traditional translation work has required translators to learn both a biblical language and a target language. Whole Word Institute provides biblical Hebrew training to nationals who already know the language and culture of the target translation.

"This partnership is a privilege for Corban," says Corban University Dean of the School of Ministry, Dr. Greg Trull. "We are blessed to work with brilliant Christian linguists with whom we have built a cuttingedge immersive program to train Bible translators."

Corban University partners with Whole Word Institute to oversee elements of its academic program and ensure accreditation approval. Currently, of the more than 7,000 languages in the world, over 6,000 do not have access to the full Bible. In addition, of the 400+ sign languages in the world, only one has a full translation of the Bible suitable for teaching and preaching. These areas are where the partnership aims to equip its graduates to make a difference. Already, Whole Word Institute graduates are working in 29 nations, with 64 distinct languages, serving over 111 million speakers.



Corban considers partnerships like this as integral to fulfilling the University's mission to educate Christians who will make a difference in the world for Jesus Christ. "Whole Word Institute embodies our mission," said Dr. Trull. "They make the first difference in many coming to Christ, providing the Word for millions who have never heard it."

FALL SPORTS UPDATE

Volleyball: Coach McLain enters her tenth season leading the Warriors and currently has the program ranked No. 7 in the NAIA and well on their way toward a ninth-consecutive NAIA National Tournament appearance, boasting an 11-1 record.

Men's Soccer: Optimism surrounds the team with the hiring of Corban University and men's soccer alum Josh Rios Noonkester, as the Warriors are still building the program back up following a 2022 CCC third place finish.

Women's Soccer: With his first batch of recruits now officially on the team, Coach Travez Whyte begins his second season as the head coach and has the Warriors sitting at 3-2-1 overall as they enter conference play.

Men's Cross Country: After earning an NAIA Top 25 ranking to end the 2023 season, the team retained that ranking heading into the new year at No. 22 overall. All but one of their NAIA national qualifying teammates return this season.

Women's Cross Country: One of the largest recruiting classes in women's cross country history has the team running with a sense of optimism heading into the 2024 season.

Men's & Women's Golf: Both teams were selected to finish sixth in their respective CCC coaches' preseason polls. Recently, graduate student Kristin Senatra finished in third place overall at the Bushnell Invitational to lead the women's program and represent the highest placed Warrior out of both teams.

NEW HEAD COACH KYLIE FRIZELL BRINGS TENACITY TO WARRIOR BASKETBALL

Kylie Frizell is a "coach's kid." Her father coached high school basketball for her entire life in the state of Ohio, and Kylie grew up in the gym, working on her jump shot before she even had the strength to heave a basketball up and into a full-sized hoop.

Now, she is following in her father's footsteps as the new head coach of the Corban women's basketball team. But her journey here was an unexpected one. Following a decorated playing career at NCAA DII Wheeling University, Frizell served coaching stints at DII Ashland University, Ursuline College, and then, most recently, at nearby Pacific University where she intended to train under head coach Alicia Parker as she prepared for her first head coaching gig.

The opportunity came far sooner than she expected. "I had no intentions of leaving Pacific," Frizell says. It was coach Parker, who had coincidentally played under current Corban Athletic Director, Bill Pilgeram, as a high schooler in Montana, who pushed her to apply. "My faith has always been the foundation of why I coach," Frizell says. "The thought of integrating that completely into a program was so enticing."

Thrilled by the prospect of coaching at a Christian university, Frizell applied and, after an extensive interview process, was named the next head coach. "I feel like God led me to be in the right time and place for when the job opened up," she says.

At the helm of the program, Frizell's new squad is

operating under her three core principles, driven by verses gleaned from Romans 12:10-12: "Honor one another above yourselves. Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord. Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer."

"Being a great teammate comes first," she says. "Be a servant even when things aren't going well. Be tenacious, with spiritual fervor on and off the court, competing, serving, and living for the Lord. And finally, trust each other."

For Warrior fans, Frizell wants them to expect relentlessness and tenacity from her team. She coins the

term "benergy"—bench energy—when describing her team, but she has no plans of allowing that same relentless pursuit to stop after the final buzzer. "Off the court, we are going to be a team that has deep rooted connections that allow for difficult conversations, built on trust, that push us to grow."

Frizell is no longer just a coach's kid. She is the coach. And while she strives to instill tenacity and servanthood in her players, she still finds herself working on her jump shot just as she did as a young girl. Only now she does it alongside her team, and her shots more than reach the hoop.

CORBAN IN THEIR WORDS: SHAELEE AND SHANELLE

"If we're going to college, we're going together." Identical twin sisters Shaelee and Shanelle Killorn knew they were looking for a college experience that they could share, but finding one school that held all their unique interests would be difficult. They began with a list of over 50 schools, winnowing it down as they focused on finding a small Christian environment where they could play soccer, be challenged in their degrees, and grow in their faith.

Arriving on Corban's campus for a visit, the difference was immediate. "It was something we hadn't felt on any of our

other tours, and speaking to other Corban students who have shared a similar experience, it's easy for me to see the Holy Spirit was working in our lives," Shaelee says. "I actually felt known at Corban," Shanelle adds. "Even during a short time on campus I could tell that people genuinely cared. They wanted to know me by name."

At Corban, the Killorns have flourished in a community that challenges them to think critically, engage in meaningful relationships, and live a life that truly makes a difference for God's kingdom. "Corban has pushed me to have a more open mind toward interacting with others about my faith," Shaelee says. "I've learned how to effectively live out and share the gospel. I've grown in my theological knowledge and confidence, and I think, by the end of my time here I will be able to go out into the world and be more of a messenger for the good news."



INAUGURAL COHORT OF NURSING STUDENTS BEGINS CLASSES ON CAMPUS

This fall, Corban University's inaugural cohort of nursing students began their first day of instruction. These 14 students will be the first to undertake Corban's newest degree, a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN), which looks to add a unique voice to the nursing education landscape, equipping students to meet a global and growing need for nurses through courses taught from a biblical perspective.

"It's an exciting time to finally see nursing students on campus," said Corban University Director of Nursing, Dr. Beth Bailey. "Many hours of prayer, work, and preparation have culminated in this day becoming a reality."

For one of these students, freshman Elysia Bock, Corban's combination of faith focus, a strong science core, and hands-on training was what led her to sign on as a member of this first class. "I chose Corban because, out of all the schools I looked at, it aligned with my views as a Christian and my goals as a student the best," she said. "I'm excited about learning nursing from a biblical perspective and growing to become a nurse alongside a cohort whose main focus is to be a light for the Lord."

During their four years, Corban nursing students will benefit from unique opportunities such as engaging in real-world research through resources like Corban's SCoPE research lab, run in partnership with Santiam Hospital, building hands-on experience in clinical and healthcare setting through expanding partnerships with local hospitals, and serving alongside medical professionals in global and developing settings during yearly medical mission trips to places like Honduras.

While the program is in its infancy, Dr. Bailey and the leadership at Corban University are excited to add

another degree offering that will help to meet a growing need in the marketplace while also closely aligning with the University's mission "to educate Christians who will make a difference in the world for Jesus Christ."

CORBAN STUDENTS SAM AND STACSIA SHARE THE GOSPEL AT PARIS OLYMPICS

"It's not always easy to be an American in Paris," says junior intercultural studies major, Sam Bonkowski. Recently, Sam was part of a street evangelism team that took to the City of Lights to share the gospel during the 2024 Summer Olympics.

With ten-hour days spent canvasing crowds in the summer heat and humidity, walking miles between sites, and facing continual rejection, she struggled to see her purpose during the early days of the trip. Thankfully, Sam was not alone. She was joined by fellow Corban student, Stacsia Crossan. "Together, we really sought the Lord about it, and that's when we started to turn a corner," Sam says.

"It was way out of my comfort zone, standing on the street corner, trying to get people walking by to stop and talk with me," Stacsia adds. "But I was learning how to be obedient and plant seeds, even when I knew I wouldn't always see the reward."

It wasn't until the two arrived back home that they began to fully process their experience. "I may not have been able to share the gospel with every person that I handed a tract to," Sam says, "but if they read about Christianity, and the small interaction they have with a Christian is kind, respectful, and bold about the truth of the gospel, then that is a positive association that God can use."

For Stacsia, her experience as a foreigner, facing cultural and language barriers every day, gifted her with new perspective concerning her community at home. "I gained an understanding of what it could be like for people coming here, and to be on the lookout for how to reach out to people who may be experiencing that here," she says.

While it may not always be easy being an American in Paris, Sam and Stacsia are grateful for the chance to share the gospel, for the growth produced by perseverance, and for the privileges that they enjoy at home—a home on Corban's campus. "I'm so grateful to come home to a place that nurtures and encourages that same missional lifestyle we adopted in Paris," Sam says. "Instead of jumping back into a culture that disregards all that happened on the trip, here it is a continual conversation about sharing the gospel. I am so grateful to be at Corban."

EYES ON TRADITION: WORLD OUTREACH WEEK

Every fall around this time of year the colors start to change on Corban's campus. But it isn't just the leaves. The flags of every nation begin to line the winding pathways, hung from the eaves of classroom buildings and stretching through the branches of our wooded hillside. You know it's WOW when the flags come out.

Did you know that World Outreach Week is one of our longest standing traditions? Dating back to at least 1967, and originally called Corban's "Annual Missionary Conference," WOW has taken many forms. But the heart has always remained the same—uniting as a campus to learn about the importance of missions and God's kingdom work all around the globe.

This year's theme, "Your Word is Truth," focused on the immeasurable value and impact of biblical translation efforts around the world, highlighted by keynote speaker, Dr. Greg Pruett, who has served as President of Pioneer Bible Translators since 2007.

WOW challenged students to think seriously about missions each day as they interacted with the many missionaries and missions organizations on campus. In the evenings, workshops addressed topics ranging from Scripture access through media to raising support, entrepreneurship in missions to the challenges of addressing cultural religion.

"This is such a crucial moment of the year to challenge students to think about the current reach of the gospel globally," says Professor of Intercultural Studies, Dr. Annette Harrison. "It's a week dedicated to exposing our Corban community to the fact that Christianity might look different around the world, and to bring awareness to the many organizations and ministries that are out there serving, and to the many unique ways students could use their skills to serve in the future."
