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

AN OVERVIEW OF THE CORE PRACTICES OF TEACHING FOR TRANSFORMATION (TFT)

Teaching for Transformation (TfT) is a design framework for the creation of authentic, formational learning experiences rooted in a transformational worldview. These learning experiences invite, nurture, and empower teachers and students to play their part in God's story through their everyday learning. The core practices of TfT are practiced in over 100 schools worldwide to create learning experiences that empower teachers and students to explore their role in the kingdom story.

TEACHING CONTENT THROUGH READING AND WRITING Professor Angela Sotelo, Corban University Director of ESOL

Would you like to help students build stronger academic vocabulary and language use? GLAD (Guided Language Acquisition by Design) is a set of proven strategies that allow all levels of learner to build strong academic vocabulary understandings, reinforce formal language structures, and results in more purposeful connections with important content. In this session, we will learn a few high engagement strategies that can be used in any content area and are applicable for all grade levels K-8. (This session is repeated from last year)

STUDENT SUPPORT FOR STUDENT SUCCESS

With the goal of learning how to grow their minds without losing ours, we will seek to understand our students and their needs, understand the various types of support we can offer, and understand what success actually means for our students. When we understand, then we can act, and our actions will positively impact the lives of those we serve!

MENTAL HEALTH: CARING FOR YOUR STUDENTS & YOURSELF

Dr. Lori Schelske, Corban University Professor, Director of Corban Counseling Clinics, Director, CMHC Program

This session will include current facts and statistics about youth mental health as well as tools teachers can use to build safe relationships and promote student emotional awareness. We will also discuss tools for self-care and self-compassion so that teachers can maintain the internal resources and stamina to do what they do for the long-haul.
